

DISTRICT INFORMATION

School District Defined: Rockville Centre Union Free School District is often called the Rockville Centre Public Schools. The School District and the Village of Rockville Centre are two separate units of government, each entirely independent of the other. They do not cover the same territory. The District includes most, but not all, of the Village, and also includes part of the area north of the Village known as South Hempstead. It has approximately 24,000 residents.

Board of Education: A Board of Education consisting of five members, elected by the people and serving without salary, is responsible for the schools. Each member serves for a term of three years. Elections are held each year on the third Tuesday in May. Board meetings are usually held twice a month.

School Staff: The task of educating approximately 3,600 students from kindergarten through high school is a large one and requires the unceasing attention and devoted efforts of about 700 teachers and support staff, as well as a clerical and maintenance staff of approximately 100 employees. Additional staff members are employed on a part-time basis.

School Buildings: The School District operates five elementary schools, one middle and one high school. Administrative offices are housed in the William H. Johnson Administrative Building, which is located on the high school campus.

Budget: In 2023-2024, a budget of \$136,456,494 is needed for operation and maintenance of the buildings, staff salaries, textbooks, supplies and other school expenses. If you are interested in details of the budget, they are available in the William H. Johnson Administrative Building or on our website, www.rvcschools.org. Each year a public hearing is held on the budget before it is voted upon by the community. Voting takes place in the spring. Details of the budget, voter qualifications, registration and voting procedures are made public in advance through the District website and the School District Budget Brochure which is mailed to all residents.

School Messenger: School closings and other urgent messages are sent through SchoolMessenger, a telephone and email communication system for emergency notifications. Contact information on file for students and staff is utilized for these notifications. Other community members, who wish to receive districtwide messages, should send an email with their name, phone number and/or email address to social@rvcschools.org or a letter to the Superintendent's Office in the William H. Johnson Administrative Building at 128 Shepherd Street, Rockville Centre, New York, 11570, with a request to be added to this messaging list. Parents who would like to change their contact information should contact the main office of their child's school.

School Census: The school census is taken annually by mail. The census is required by State Education Law and assists the District in its planning, including enrollment projections and enforcement of the compulsory education law. It also provides useful data for other governmental bodies such as the Nassau County Planning Commission. The child count is made from ages birth through 18; for disabled children the age is extended through 21.

Accessibility to School Events: The Rockville Centre Union Free School District welcomes the community to its public events. If you would like to attend an event scheduled in the School District but are physically challenged and might require assistance in order to attend, please contact Jeanne Love, the Americans with Disabilities Act Compliance Officer, at 1-516-255-8928.

Committee on Special Education: As per Part 200 of the Commissioner's Regulations and pursuant to PL-99-457 and Section 4410 of the Education Law, any parent or guardian that has a child 21 years old or younger with a disability or suspected disability may refer the child for an evaluation by the Committee on Special Education to determine eligibility for special education programs and services. Psychologists: School psychologists evaluate students suspected of having learning or other disabilities. School psychologists also review students' records, provide individual and group counseling to students and meet with teachers, school counselors, parents and administrators.

Social Workers: District social workers provide assistance to students, parents, teachers, pupil personnel staff and administrators. Such assistance involves individual and group counseling, visits to the home, interviews with students, contacts with school personnel and referrals to or involvement of community resources.

Pediatric Behavioral Health Center: The Rockville Centre Union Free School District has partnered with Northwell and a consortium of local school districts to open a Pediatric Behavioral Health Center in Rockville Centre. This Center provides urgent evaluations and treatment to assist children and adolescents and their families experiencing a behavioral health crisis. The Center is located at 100 Merrick Road, Rockville Centre, NY 11570 and can be reached by calling 1-516-927-1630. The Pediatric Behavioral Health service at Rockville Centre offers a number of different services to patients including, but not limited to, crisis psychotherapy, care coordination, evidence-based screening/risk assessments, short-term crisis treatment, referral and linkage to follow-up care and accessing higher level of care as needed. Students may be referred by school personnel or by parents directly. In order to provide the best patient care possible, the treatment team may consult with the patient's medical physician, school personnel or previous mental health providers.

Additional Services: Other areas of support services are available to provide remedial, corrective or developmental instruction. Services in these areas generally involve an initial referral and evaluation, a series of scheduled instructional sessions, and a follow-up assessment of student progress. These areas may include:

- English as a New Language
- · Speech Improvement Services
- Educationally Related Support Services

Medications: State law prohibits the dispensing of medication, including any nonprescription drugs such as Tylenol, Advil, etc., **EXCEPT** by a written request from the parent/parental relation **and** a written order from a licensed New York State health care provider (physician, nurse practitioner or physician assistant). Students may carry and self-administer medications ONLY if the health care provider authorizes it. All medication orders, including those students who are authorized to carry his/her own medications, must be given to the school nurse of that building. These medication forms are available in the nurse's office and on the school website, www.rvcschools.org.

Physical Assessments: NYS Law mandates two types of health appraisals. The first is a complete physical examination that is required for all new entrants and in grades K, 1, 3, 5, 7, 9 and 11. The second is an annual assessment for participation in interscholastic sports.

Physical examinations may be completed by your private health care provider or the school physician. All exams are acceptable for 12 months from the date of examination. All forms must be signed and stamped by the medical examiner and submitted on the new standardized examination form. These forms are available in the nurse's office and on the school website. The District advises that the student's best interests are served if the examination is done by his/her own health care provider as he/she is the person best acquainted with their health problems, and is able to advise, treat and keep immunizations current.

Physical examinations for working paper certificates may be obtained by appointment during the school year, performed by the school physician, if the child does not have a current examination on file.

Screenings: Education Law, Article 19, Section 905 and the Regulations of the Commissioner of Education, Sections 136.1 and 136.3 require schools to provide vision, hearing and scoliosis screenings at least once in each school year for each child. Vision screenings occur for all new entrants and students in grades K, 1, 3, 5, 7 and 11. Hearing screenings occur for all new entrants and students in grades K, 1, 3, 5, 7 and 11. Scoliosis screenings occur for female students in grades 5 and 7 and male students in grade 9 during the month of March each school year, unless a child has a current screening from his/her health care provider on file or a parent/person in parental relation files their written objection to the school nurse on or before February 28.

- 1. Demonstrated serologic evidence of measles, mumps or rubella antibodies or laboratory confirmation of these diseases is acceptable proof of immunity to these diseases. Serologic tests for polio are acceptable proof of immunity only if the test was performed before September 1, 2019, and all three serotypes were positive. A positive blood test for hepatitis B surface antibody is acceptable proof of immunity to hepatitis B. Demonstrated serologic evidence of varicella antibodies, laboratory confirmation of varicella disease or diagnosis by a physician, physician assistant or nurse practitioner that a child has had varicella disease is acceptable proof of immunity to varicella.
- 2. Diphtheria and tetanus toxoids and acellular pertussis (DTaP) vaccine. (Minimum age: 6 weeks)
- a. Children starting the series on time should receive a 5-dose series of DTaP vaccine at 2 months, 4 months, 6 months and at 15 through 18 months and at 4 years or older. The fourth dose may be received as early as age 12 months, provided at least 6 months have elapsed since the third dose. However, the fourth dose of DTaP need not be repeated if it was administered at least 4 months after the third dose of DTaP. The final dose in the series must be received on or after the fourth birthday and at least 6 months after the previous dose.
- b. If the fourth dose of DTaP was administered at 4 years or older, and at least 6 months after dose 3, the fifth (booster) dose of DTaP vaccine is not required.
- c. For children born before 1/1/2005, only immunity to diphtheria is required and doses of DT and Td can meet this requirement.
- d. Children 7 years and older who are not fully immunized with the childhood DTaP vaccine series should receive Tdap vaccine as the final dose in the catch-up series; if additional doses are needed, use Td or Tdap vaccine. If the first dose was received before their first birthday, then 4 doses are required, as long as the first dose was received at 4 years or older. If the first dose was received on or after the first birthday, then 3 doses are required, as long as the first dose was received at 4 years or older.
- 3. Tetanus and diphtheria toxoids and acellular pertussis (Tdap) adolescent booster vaccine. (Minimum age for grade 6: 10 years; minimum age for grades 7 through 12: 7 years)
- a. Students 11 years or older entering grades 6 through 12 are required to have one dose of Tdap.
- b. In addition to the grade 6 through 12 requirement, Tdap may also be given as part of the catch-up series for students 7 years of age and older who are not fully immunized with the childhood DTaP series, as described above. In school year 2020-2021, only doses of Tdap given at age 10 years or older will satisfy the Tdap requirement for students in grade 6; however, doses of Tdap given at age 7 years or older will satisfy the requirement for students in grades 7 through 12.
- c. Students who are 10 years old in grade 6 and who have not yet received a Tdap vaccine are in compliance until they turn 11 years old.
- 4. Inactivated polio vaccine (IPV) or oral polio vaccine (OPV). (Minimum age: 6 weeks)
- a. Children starting the series on time should receive a series of IPV at 2 months, 4 months and at 6 through 18 months, and at 4 years or older. The final dose in the series must be received on or after the fourth birthday and at least 6 months after the previous dose.
- b. For students who received their fourth dose before age 4 and prior to August 7, 2010, 4 doses separated by at least 4 weeks is sufficient.
- c. If the third dose of polio vaccine was received at 4 years or older and at least 6 months after the previous dose, the fourth dose of polio vaccine is not required.
- d. Only trivalent OPV (tOPV) counts toward NYS school polio vaccine requirements. Doses of OPV given before April 1, 2016, should be counted unless specifically noted as monovalent, bivalent or as given during a poliovirus immunization campaign. Doses of OPV given on or after April 1, 2016, should not be counted.
- 5. Measles, mumps, and rubella (MMR) vaccine. (Minimum age: 12 months)
 - a. The first dose of MMR vaccine must have been received on or after the first birthday. The second dose must have been received at least 28 days (4 weeks) after the first dose to be considered valid.
 - b. Measles: One dose is required for prekindergarten. Two doses are required for grades kindergarten

- through 12.
- c. Mumps: One dose is required for prekindergarten. Two doses are required for grades kindergarten through 12.
- d. Rubella: At least one dose is required for all grades (prekindergarten through 12.)
- 6. Hepatitis B vaccine.
 - a. Dose 1 may be given at birth or anytime thereafter. Dose 2 must be given at least 4 weeks (28 days) after dose 1. Dose 3 must be at least 8 weeks after dose 2 AND at least 16 weeks after dose 1 AND no earlier than age 24 weeks (when R doses are given, substitute "dose R" for "dose 3" in these calculations).
 - b. Two doses of adult hepatitis B vaccine (Recombivax) received at least 4 months apart at age 11 through 15 years will meet the requirement.
- 7. Varicella (chickenpox) vaccine. (Minimum age: 12 months)
 - a. The first dose of varicella vaccine must have been received on or after the first birthday. The second dose must have been received at least 28 days (4 weeks) after the first dose to be considered valid.
 - b. For children younger than 13 years, the recommended minimum interval between doses is 3 months (if the second dose was administered at least 4 weeks after the first dose, it can be accepted as valid); for persons 13 years and older, the minimum interval between doses is 4 weeks.
- 8. Meningococcal conjugate ACWY vaccine (MenACWY). (Minimum age for grade 7: 10 years; minimum age for grades 8 through 12: 6 weeks).
 - a. One dose of meningococcal conjugate vaccine (Menactra or Menveo) is required for students entering grades 7, 8, 9, 10 and 11.
 - b. For students in grade 12, if the first dose of meningococcal conjugate vaccine was received at 16 years or older, the second (booster) dose is not required.
- c. The second dose must have been received at 16 years or older. The minimum interval between doses is 8 weeks.
- 9. Haemophilus influenzae Type b (Hib) conjugate vaccine. (Minimum age: 6 weeks)
 - a. Children starting the series on time should receive Hib vaccine at 2 months, 4 months, 6 months and at 12 through 15 months. Children older than 15 months must get caught up according to the ACIP catch-up schedule. The final dose must be received on or after 12 months,
 - b. If 2 doses of vaccine were received before age 12 months, only 3 doses are required with dose 3 at 12 through 15 months and at least 8 weeks after dose 2.
 - c. If dose 1 was received at age 12 through 14 months, only 2 doses are required with dose 2 at least 8 weeks after dose 1.
 - d. If dose 1 was received at 15 months or older, only 1 dose is required.
 - e. Hib vaccine is not required for children 5 years or older.
- 10. Pneumococcal conjugate vaccine (PCV). (Minimum age: 6 weeks)
 - a. Children starting the series on time should receive PCV vaccine at 2 months, 4 months, 6 months and at 12 through 15 months. Children older than 15 months must get caught up according to the ACIP catch-up schedule. The final dose must be received on or after 12 months.
 - b. Unvaccinated children ages 7 through 11 months are required to receive 2 doses, at least 4 weeks apart, followed by a third dose at 12 through 15 months.
 - c. Unvaccinated children ages 12 through 23 months are required to receive 2 doses of vaccine at least 8 weeks apart.
 - d. If one dose of vaccine was received at 24 months or older, no further doses are required.
 - e. PCV is not required for children 5 years or older.

District Guidelines for Use of Facilities and Field/Turf/Grounds: Within budget limitations, the **Pesticide Notification:** The Rockville Centre Union Free School District may use pesticide Board of Education wishes residents of the District to have the benefit of the use of school facilities afterschool hours insofar as this is feasible without interfering with the regular school program. Thus the District's buildings and grounds are used for many activities which are educational, cultural, recreational and civic in nature and which are primarily for the benefit of School District residents. As part of this program of general use of school facilities, the School District cooperates with the Village of Rockville Centre by making the schools available for the Village Recreation Program including summer recreation programs.

The School District has developed a policy/regulation (3280/3280R) which outlines community use of school facilities by outside organizations and/or members of the community and procedures for obtaining permission for use. We have outlined below some guidelines to keep in mind when entering School District property for personal/community use.

Public use of outside field/turf/grounds is permitted on nonschool days between sunup and sundown and on school days during nonschool hours as follows:

Types of activities allowed **WITHOUT** an approved permit:

- Jogging, walking, running
- Playing catch, stickball
- Use of basketball hoops
- Use of elementary playground equipment
- · Use of tennis courts (one-hour maximum) Professional tennis lessons not permitted.

Organized activities allowed **WITH** an approved permit:

Use of school rooms, gymnasiums, auditoriums, main field/turf and ball fields

Activities that are **PROHIBITED AT ALL TIMES**:

- Use of tobacco, alcohol, drugs
- Walking of pets
- Bicycles, strollers or motorized vehicles on the field/turf/track
- Skateboarding, roller blading, roller skating, placing lounge chairs on field/turf/track
- Golfing

The School District is required to maintain a list of parents, guardians and staff who wish to receive 48hour written advance notice from the school of an actual pesticide application. The 48-hour written advance notice will include the following:

- A) The specific date and location of the upcoming pesticide application
- B) The pesticide product name and EPA Product Registration number
- C) The name of the school representative to contact for further information

Asbestos Compliance: The Director of Facilities is the official designee for asbestos monitoring and abatement activities. Reports, which provide comprehensive information on asbestos bearing materials (Management Plans), are located in his office and are available for public inspection, upon request. Every six months the District's designee conducts a visual surveillance of each building.

Wellness Program: The District has developed Wellness Committees in an effort to provide a school environment that promotes and protects children's health, well-being, and the ability to learn by fostering healthy eating and physical activity. Directory Information: The Rockville Centre Union Free School District, pursuant to Sec. 438, Pub. L. 90-247, Title IV, Sub. 99.37 known as the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act ("FERPA"), designates the following personally identifiable information contained in a student's educational record as "Directory Information" which may be publicly released without prior consent: (1) Student's name, (2) Student's address, (3) Student's date of birth, (4) Major field of study, (5) Participation in officially recognized activities and sports, (6) Weight and height of members of athletic teams, (7) Dates of attendance, (8) Degrees, honors and awards received, (9) Names of student's parents, (10) Most recent educational agency or institution attended by the student, (11) Photography or imagery of the student (which may be released and appear to the public via mediums including, but not limited to, print and electronic media, the internet, television, or annual yearbooks published by the District). If the student from whom information is sought by the media does not want to be interviewed, photographed and/or videotaped, or if the parent/guardian of the student denies permission for media access to his/her child, upon notice of same, such access will be denied by the building principal/designee and/or the Superintendent of Schools.

Requests that Directory Information above not be publicly released, without their consent, may be made by parents, legal guardians or students who have reached the age of 18 by writing to the School District Clerk at 128 Shepherd Street, Rockville Centre, NY 11570 by September 30 of each school year. Please be sure to include student's name, school and grade level. The request not to publicly release information expires at the end of each school year. A letter must be submitted each year in order to continue nonrelease.

All student educational records, and records that were created as a result of a student receiving special education services under Part B of the IDEA, may also be released to another school or postsecondary institution at which the student seeks or intends to enroll.

Military Recruiters' Access to High School Students and Information on Students: The District will comply with requests from military recruiters and institutions of higher education (IHEs) for access to the name, address and telephone listing of each secondary school student, except for any student whose parent (or the student if he or she is at least 18 years of age) has submitted a written request to opt out of this disclosure, in which case the information will not be released without the parent's (or student's, if he or she is at least 18 years of age) prior written consent. Parents wishing to exercise their option to withhold such information, without prior written parental consent, may do so by obtaining a form from the South Side High School Main Office, completing the form, and returning it to the Principal's Office at South Side High School by September 30 of each school year.

<u>Student Education Records:</u> In accordance with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 ("FERPA") and Rockville Centre School District Policy, parents, and students over 18 years of age, have the right to inspect and review their child's/student education records or to request the amendment of records believed to be inaccurate or misleading. Student education records are private unless the parent or student older than 18 consents to disclosure of personally

identifiable information. FERPA authorizes disclosure of personal information without consent in limited circumstances. Procedures for the student record inspection and review process may be obtained from building principals or the District Clerk.

Student Privacy Notice: The Rockville Centre Union Free School District has adopted Policy 7243, Student Privacy, Parental Access to Information, and Administration of Certain Physical Examinations to Minors. Policy 7243 calls for notification to all parents and guardians of specific types of surveys or activities which will be conducted during the school year and/or during the summer program in accordance with law by either individual schools or the School District. Please be aware that if the School District or your child's school principal plans to administer a survey or activity covered by this policy, you will be directly notified in writing prior thereto and then given 10 days to opt your child out of participation.

Annual Professional Performance Review Release of Information: According to New York State Education Law 3012-d parents/legal guardians may request final quality ratings of their child's teacher or principal. Specific information on procedures that outline how parents may request this information can be found on the District website. Federal Breakfast and Lunch Program: Due to a very low participation rate in the past, elementary schools will not serve breakfast. They will, however, continue to serve lunch daily. As always, the Middle School and High School will continue to serve both breakfast and lunch daily.

Registration K-12: Registration for kindergarten is held at South Side High School in January of the year prior to entrance. Your child must be 5 years of age or more by December 1 of the year he/she starts school. Registration for all grades takes place year-round and can be accessed on the District Web Site at www.rvcschools.org or by contacting the Registrar's Office located in Room 1202 of South Side High School. It is important to register your child as early as possible. If you have questions regarding eligibility for registration, please call the Registrar at 1-516-255-8926. An information booklet about kindergarten is available at your child's home school. Parents are required to present certification of birth or baptism at the time of registration.

It is advisable for kindergarten candidates to have physical and dental examinations before September. The School Health Office will need proof of these examinations, together with information concerning dates of immunizations and any communicable diseases, which the child has had. Kindergarten screening will be scheduled during the months of April and May, prior to entrance into kindergarten.

Regular attendance and punctuality in kindergarten is as important as in any other grade. Parents' notes explaining each absence and tardiness are required of kindergarten parents as in all other grades.

It should be noted that if it is determined that a student is not living in the Rockville Centre School District or that residency is solely for the purpose of attending Rockville Centre Schools, the student risks exclusion from school and the parent will be charged with the full cost of the yearly tuition. This tuition will range from \$16,909 to \$100,251 depending on the services provided.

Elementary School hours are 8:50 a.m.-3:26 p.m.. Middle School and High School schedules are announced to students.

Attendance: It is the parent's/person in parental relation's responsibility to call the Attendance Office/ Absence Hotline first thing in the morning on the day of your child's absence. A message can be left at any time on the answering machine. Students who are absent from school must present a written note from their parent/person in parental relation as soon as the student returns to classes.

Absence and Lateness: School District Policy 7110 outlines the District's attendance and lateness policy. This policy can be found on the District website. State Education law and School District policy permit legal absence from school for the following reasons only:

Personal illness
Illness or death in the family
Impassable roads or weather making travel unsafe
Religious observance
Quarantine
Required court appearances
Attendance at a health clinic
Approved college visits
Approved cooperative work programs
Military obligations

A note explaining the reason and date of absence is required upon return of the child to school. Whenever it is possible for parents to advise the school by telephone of the reason for a child's absence, a phone call would be advised, but it will still be necessary to send a written excuse when the child returns.

Please refer to the Middle School and High School student agendas for specific information on disciplinary consequences which may result from irregular attendance and lateness patterns.

<u>Parent-Teacher Conferences Grades K-5:</u> Two parent-teacher conferences are held each year to review each student's growth. This year, they will be scheduled in December and March.

<u>Parent-Teacher Conferences Grades 6-12:</u> Two parent-teacher conferences are held each year to review each student's growth. This year, they will be scheduled in the fall and early spring.

Summer Programs Consists of the Following:

K-5 Summer Enrichment: Enrichment classes are offered to students in grades K-5 from Monday through Thursday, 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. The Enrichment Program runs for 20 days from late June or early July through early August. Students choose three electives from a program which includes athletics, art, music, cooking, academic enrichment, technology, crafts and more.

Pre-K Program: Children entering kindergarten in September are offered an opportunity for summer fun, enrichment and socialization. Children are introduced to kindergarten skills and experiences while meeting new friends and classmates in a relaxed environment. The Pre-K program runs for 20 days from late June or early July through early August. The program runs Monday through Thursday from 8:30 a.m. – 11:30 a.m.

High School and Middle School Remediation: Academic review for middle and high school students requiring course or regents exam remediation are offered Monday through Thursday from 8:30 a.m. - 11:30 a.m. Specific registration information is available through the Middle School and High School Counseling departments.

Vocational Education: The District cooperates with the Nassau County Board of Cooperative Educational Services in meeting the needs of students who wish to take specialized vocational courses. Under the program, students in grades 11 & 12 attend South Side High School for half of each day and a vocational school the remainder of the day. Detailed information about this program and other vocational programs is available at the High School Guidance Office.

<u>Community Education Department:</u> The Community Education Department offers several programs designed to enhance the educational opportunities of both children and adults in Rockville Centre.

Adult Education: Offers a variety of courses each semester to adults in evening programs that are designed to meet the diverse interests of the community. Classes are offered in: the Arts, Business/Financial/Legal, Computers, Crafts, Fitness/Health, Hobbies, Languages and Music/Dance. Spring and Fall brochures are mailed semiannually.

Seniorversity: In cooperation with the Senior Center, we offer classes at a reduced cost to Rockville Centre residents on many subjects at the Sandel Senior Center.

ACE Program: On six Saturdays, from 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. in January, February and March, children in kindergarten through sixth grade have the opportunity to attend programs designed to expand their social, creative, cultural and educational horizons. A brochure is mailed in December for the Academic and Cultural Enrichment Program.

Regents Review Program: Runs for five weeks in the months of May and June. Classes meet twice a week for an hour and a half each. All of our classes are taught by knowledgeable New York State licensed, active teachers in their respective subjects.

Project GREAT: Housed in the individual elementary schools, Project GREAT provides a safe, pleasant environment for children from kindergarten to fifth grade who reside in the Rockville Centre Union Free School District. Morning Project GREAT runs from 7:00 a.m. to 8:50 a.m. and PM Project GREAT operates from the close of school to 6:30 p.m. Two pickup times are available for PM Project GREAT, one at 5:00 p.m. and one at 6:30 p.m. Children may attend one to five days per week from September through June. Applications are available on the District website or by calling 1-516-255-8953. You can also email projectgreat@rvcschools.org with questions.

Emergencies: If your child suffers a minor accident, necessary first aid will be rendered. If the injury is one that will require additional medical treatment, you will be contacted immediately. For this reason, we request that you complete the "EMERGENCY HOME CONTACT CARD" and keep it up-to-date. The primary purpose of the contact card is for the school to be able to reach a parent in the event a child becomes ill or is injured while in school.


